What a career Gene Pitney has had! He's Ш charted sixteen Top 40 singles and released 47 albums. Q - You've always had great success overseas, but, the British in particular really took a liking to you. What do think accounts for that? vou A - I started over there. It was a strange time to have success, because the first big record I had over there was around '64. It was right smack in the middle of the British Invasion, when The Stones, The Beatles and just about everybody else, were dominating the world market. I had a song called "Twenty Four Hours From Tulsa" which was right against the grain of what was going on, but it was a monstrous success for me. They're kind of like a Country 'n' Western fan. Once they're a fan of yours, they're pretty much a fan for life. I've gone back and done at least one tour a year over the last 25 vears.

Q - How many months of the year are you on the road? A - That varies an awful lot. I was traveling 11 months of the year, then I cut back to 6. I've found that when I made the commitment to cut back on my time, which was really made for my family's benefit, I benefited myself, much, much, more. I didn't know enough to stand back and get away from what I was doing. I think anybody who's in any job at all, I don't care what it is, if you just keep hammering away at it, you work just as hard, but you lose the one hundred per cent. Your one hundred per cent becomes ninety per cent, eighty per cent, but you're still hammering away, so you think you've got the same output. You become mechanical. If I didn't have that chance to back away, for that reason, I never would have known it. When I did walk away and take 2-3 months off, then went back and did a 'live' performance, the enthusiasm was so incredible. I hadn't had that for a long time.

Q - You actually grew up in a town called Rockford! What were vour early influences? A- Yeah, an aptly named town for a pop singer, I always thought! I grew up liking music as a kid, and I was quite adept at a number of instruments while at school, but outside of playing and listening to music, I was mainly an outdoors person - in other words when all the other kids were playing baseball and football or watching TV, I was away fishing and trapping, collecting things - just a little bit of a loner in my own way I think. Q- Is it true that you are actually a gualified taxidermist? A- Yeah - I went to the NorthWestern School of Taxidermy! I wouldn't want to try it today, because today, it's a whole different ball game, but if all else fails, I am gualified to do something other than just stand there and sing!
