Though the lyrics are rapid-fire with several people and events mentioned in a single word each:

Billy Joel captured the major images, events, and personalities of this half-century in a three-minute song.... It was pure information overload, a song that assumed we knew exactly what he was singing about...What was truly alarming was the realization that we, the listeners, for the most part understood the references.

The following events (with Joel's lyric for each appearing in **bold**) are listed in the order that they appear in the song, which is almost entirely chronological. The lyric for each individual event is brief and the events are punctuated by the chorus and other lyrical elements. The following list includes longer, more descriptive names for clarity. Events from a variety of contexts – such as popular entertainment, foreign affairs, and sports – are intermingled, giving an impression of the culture of the time as a whole. There are 118 events listed in the song.

- 1. **Harry Truman** wins the 1948 United States presidential election beginning his full presidential term; previously he was sworn in following the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt.
- 2. **Doris Day** debuts in film in *Romance on the High Seas*, featuring the popular song "It's Magic".
- 3. **Red China**: The Communist Party of China wins the Chinese Civil War, establishing the People's Republic of China on September 21.
- 4. **Johnnie Ray**: The rock and roll progenitor signs his first recording contract with Okeh Records, although he did not become popular for another two years.
- 5. **South Pacific**, the award-winning musical, opens on Broadway on April 7.
- 6. **Walter Winchell** was a radio and newspaper journalist credited with having invented the gossip column.
- 7. **Joe DiMaggio** signs a record-breaking \$100,000 contract with the New York Yankees on February 7.
- 8. **Joe McCarthy**, a U.S. Senator, gains national attention and begins his anti-Communism crusade with his Lincoln Day speech.

- 9. Richard Nixon is first elected to the United States 28. Joseph Stalin, leader of the Soviet Union, dies on an Academy Award for Best Actor, and dies in a car Senate.

- 88. British Beatlemania: The Beatles, a British rock group, gain Ringo Starr as drummer and Brian Epstein as manager, and join EMI's Parlophone label. They soon become the world's most famous rock band, with the word "Beatlemania" adopted by the press for their fans' unprecedented enthusiasm. In 1964, their tour of the United States would mark the beginning of "the British Invasion".
- 89. **Ole** Miss: A riot was fought between Southern segregationist civilians and federal and state forces as a result of the forced enrollment of black student James Meredith at the University of Mississippi.
- 90. John Glenn flew the first American manned orbital mission termed "Friendship 7" on February 20.
- 91. **Liston beats Patterson**: Sonny Liston and Floyd Patterson fought for the world heavyweight championship on September 25, ending in a first-round knockout. This match marked the first time Patterson had ever been

 - 117. Hypodermics on the shore: Medical waste was found washed up on the beaches of Long Island, New Jersey, and Connecticut after being illegally dumped at sea. Before this event, waste dumped in the oceans was an "out of sight, out of mind" affair. This has been cited as one of the crucial turning points in popular opinion on environmentalism.
